


## From the President...

Online Sales continue to grow. Through the first half of 2019, gross sales exceeded \$44,000—up almost 3% from the same period last year. During this six-month period, we have sold and shipped items to more than 30 countries. The highest-dollar item sold was a book for \$450. We currently have more than 10,000 items listed on both our AbeBooks and eBay stores. Current inventory includes a large variety of donated books (fiction, nonfiction, textbooks, home school material, and foreign language), magazines, and board games. The success of this operation could not happen without the dedicated help of all our donors and volunteers. It takes donations from the public, sorting help from our many volunteers, and our online teaming getting them listed. My many thanks to you all!

#### George H. Mahon Dedication: Continuing His Service

On August 10th, the library celebrated the dedication of an historical marker honoring George H. Mahon. The event was a success with over 100 people in attendance including the mayor, several members of the city council, and members of Mr. Mahon's family. I was also so touched to see many of the Friends of the Library in attendance wearing their iconic kaleidoscope FOL T-shirts!

After the dedication, I spoke with a man who said that working for George Mahon had changed his life. Many years ago, he was driving home from work after a long night and dozed off, resulting in his grazing and heavily scratching a parked car along the side of the road. He said that the "old" him would have kept driving since no one was around to witness the incident, but working for Mr. Mahon made him want to be a better person, who cared about others and sought to be a moral and thoughtful person. He took care of the damage to the car. This man went on to say that he often thinks of Mr. Mahon to help guide him in raising his three daughters to be good people.

How appropriate that our library was named after George Mahon! He believed in service to the public, in non-partisan work toward community improvement, and in reaching far beyond one's immediate grasp to build a better world.





# Literacy Lubbock...

Hello, everyone! I'm Elizabeth with Literacy Lubbock, and I just wanted to take a moment to thank you! Friends of the Library grants us money each year to assist in our programs, and that wouldn't be possible without you—so thank you! We appreciate the trust you've placed in us by granting us that donation, and so I wanted to take a moment to explain who we are and what we do, so you can see the impact your organization has on literacy.

We have four main programs at Literacy Lubbock. The first is our Adult Basic Education program, which is just our fancy title for teaching adults how to read. We've been fortunate over the years to give the gift of reading to our fellow Lubbock neighbors. While we hope that one day our services won't be needed, we're prepared to offer adults with dyslexic tendencies and other reading differences the opportunity to learn.

Our second program is ESL, or English as a Second Language. We assist our students with practicing how to speak, read, write, and understand English. We also help prepare them for the citizenship test, if that's something they're interested in. More than simply teaching English, our ESL classes provide an orientation to our culture so that our students may better engage, connect, and be a part of our community.

Third is our GED program. The GED is a high school equivalency exam, and it's a doozy of a test. It's expensive at \$145 per person (assuming they pass on their first try); involves math, language arts, social studies, and science; and takes a lot of time to prepare for. But it's worth it for our students. We just had one of our students, a single mother, pass her GED after attending our prep classes. She's excited for the opportunity to move on to a pharmacy technician program so she can make a better life for her son—all while proving that hard work and determination can yield second chances.

Lastly, our Family Literacy program includes our ever-popular Tiny Tots story times. Numerous studies have shown that the number one factor in determining a child's academic success—more than a parent's income—is the number of books they have at home. So each week at Tiny Tots, we read a book to children and then give them a copy of that book to take home. If we can inspire our children to read, they can do better in school, apply for better jobs, and provide for their children later on. It's a cycle, and we believe that if we can reach children early enough, we can give them the tools they need to succeed!

Like FOL, reading is central to Literacy Lubbock's mission—above all, we want everyone to have the chance to become literate, and we execute and promote programs that do just that. We are a United Way partner agency, staffed full-time by myself, Julie, and Gwen, and we depend on our dedicated volunteers to make our programs successful. We're fortunate to belong to such a giving, wonderful community, full of generous spirits who believe in our mission. And we just wanted to take a moment and share with you who we are, what we do, and to thank you for your continued support in FOL, literacy, and education!
