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

From the President...

As a kid, I had three main career goals. I wanted to be a teacher, a librarian, or—of course—an international spy. After my brothers helped me realize I had a very low threshold for torture, I soon gave up on joining the CIA. But I never changed my mind about how much fun it would be to be a teacher or a librarian. I became a history teacher and loved almost every minute of it, but I still sometimes daydream about becoming a librarian. For me libraries have always been a place of wonder and endless possibility, full of not only everything you could ever want to know, but also every story and dream imaginable. Growing up I got to know my school and public librarians VERY well. They paid attention to what I read, made suggestions about books I would love, and expertly showed me how to research and find what I needed for school projects. And it seemed like if I became a librarian, I could be constantly surrounded by books and have lots of down time to read. Needless to say, I vastly underestimated the job description. Today's librarians have an enormously complex job. In fact, when I asked our new library director, Stacy McKenzie, what a typical day would be like, I was flabbergasted when she sent me the following:

A day in the life of a librarian...

Librarians work a public reference desk where any person could walk in at any time and ask anything under the sun and that librarian must smile and say, let me see what I can find for you on that topic! In addition to that, our librarians check out books and make library cards for patrons and they may also work at our computer desk and help patrons with their computer needs which can cover everything from helping patrons fill out job applications, communicate with family by helping them set up a social networking profile or email, or helping someone compose and print out their resume.

While we are on the desk, we are usually working on other projects in between helping library patrons. We may be planning programs or researching book collections to add to the library shelves. Sometimes we are asked to do special projects, like researching how to set up a tool library, or what is the best 3D printer for the library environment. We might need to give a report to the director on projects we are involved in or we may be doing a summary presentation to our library board about a program or summer reading club. We may be planning what our next book club book should be or researching what other libraries are doing to make sure we are on track for what our patrons might need in the future.

Librarians are often involved in social issues, such as helping a teen find shelter for the night since the library is a designated Safe Place for youth. We may be helping a mom file for food stamps or HUD housing for the first time. We may be registering a person to vote or helping them get the right tax forms.

The library is a warm, safe place for our homeless population who use our libraries for everything from simple shelter to a place to search on the computers for help in their situation, and they even use the Internet to keep in touch with family and friends via email and social network sites.

Some of our homeless population have mental and social disorders which make them difficult to deal with at times. Occasionally we must make tough calls to have security ask a patron with issues to leave for the day in the hopes that they calm down and are able to return safe the next day with fewer issues.

If we do create programming for the library, we have to plan for that, which includes booking spaces for the program, scheduling it at an appropriate time, budgeting for the program supplies and snacks, and then we have to actually plan and be there for the program. Those programs can range from history to health topics to story times. We accommodate all ages and offer a wide variety of programming for the community including the summer programs where thousands of youth participate each year.

For all of the daily activities and the special programs we provide to the public, we have to market those services via posters and bookmarks in the library, and via digital slides for our in-house system and our social networking sites. In addition, we contact schools during summer reading, and prep for and attend outreach events all over the city.

We have several librarians in the Lubbock system, but all of our librarians are expected to do all of these things.

This is just off the top of my head and I know I am missing a hundred things.

Our community is truly blessed to have such an incredible group of dedicated, brilliant, hardworking, and unbelievably creative librarians. I am constantly amazed at all they do and the ideas they come up with to keep our libraries current, involved, and welcoming. So if you get the chance, tell your local librarians thank you. Like teachers, police, and firefighters, they are not paid commensurate to what they are worth. No one becomes a librarian hoping to become wealthy; they become librarians because they are passionate about helping others.

Thank you to all of the Lubbock Public Librarians who have made and continue to make our libraries an oasis of learning and knowledge.



Those that volunteer in the Online area are staying very busy. Through September 30, 2019, gross sales exceeded \$70,000. We continue to ship worldwide, with Japan being the longest distance shipped this quarter. The highest dollar item sold so far this year was a book for \$450.

We currently have more than 10,000 items listed between both our AbeBooks and eBay stores. Current inventory includes a large variety of donated books (fiction, non-fiction, textbooks, home school material, and foreign language), magazines, and board games. Lease Books to eBooks: Time to Make a Change

Spending money as efficiently as possible is not something I am very good at in my personal life! I do, however, have a bit of a knack for stretching funds and analyzing efficient purchasing in my work life, so when I learned more about our FOL-funded lease book plan through Baker & Taylor, I began to question whether these funds, used mostly for best-sellers and high-demand titles, were the best use of our money.

The lease plan involves the library purchasing a certain amount of points (each point is about \$28-\$30). Each book we lease costs one point (2 or more points for large-print books). We don't get a book in exchange for those books that we return, but instead just "use more points" to get more books. In essence, we are renting a book for a variable amount of time, but that rental amount for each book ends up being just about the same price (or in some cases more) than an outright purchase of a book for our library that we can keep indefinitely.

At one time, this plan might have been the best way to have enough best-selling books on our shelves to ensure that our patrons had a minimal wait time to get the most popular books, but now with eBooks and Audiobooks through our Libby app, that has changed. We are seeing that our eBooks will have many holds, resulting in patrons waiting several months for their books, while we end up with the same titles sitting on our shelves after the initial rush wears off. We will often see an eBook with 13 patrons waiting on hold, while 7 physical copies sit on the shelves. We have worked on a few ways to alert patrons to these copies on the shelf, but the bottom line is that our patrons enjoy the convenience and access that eBooks afford them and so we just have to make sure we are serving all of our patrons, not just those that physically walk in the doors.


So, the most efficient way to serve our patrons is to discontinue the lease book program and send more funding toward our eBook and Audiobook licenses. This will result in fewer holds for our eBook and Audiobook patrons, while it will allow us to use our print budget more thoughtfully. Print book patrons may have to wait a week or two for their copy, but the net result will be fewer patrons on hold overall and greater access and convenience for the growing number of eBook patrons.

Thanks so much for all you do to help us be able to serve our patrons with such a high level of attention and service.
